Civil War Days at Duncans Mills July 17 & 18

Now in its eleventh year, "Civil War Days at Duncans Mills" sponsored by the Casini Ranch Family Campground and the California Historical Artillery Society is rapidly becoming the West Coast's premiere summer reenacting event. This invitational event is the July club event for the ACWA and NCWA, but re-enactors from Southern California, Oregon, Nevada, Idaho and Washington are also expected to attend. Last year's event drew nearly 500 re-enactors and over 3000 public, and this year's could certainly exceed that. With the hamlet of Duncans Mills situated along the beautiful Russian River resort area many re-enactors are making it an annual outing, combining reenacting with some great vacation time.



Command and control of this invitational event change yearly between the clubs, with this year's tactical command under NCWA control. All re-enactors will need to contact their respective commands to confirm attendance. This is paramount for camp layout and battle scenario planning. If you show up without checking with your respective command, you may find yourself being placed wherever there is room.

Due to battlefield size restrictions, Artillery guns per side will be limited as set forth by each command staff. CHAS is also limiting Artillery Powder reimbursements to a total of eight Confederate and six Union Guns. All Artillery attending must contact their respective command staff.

The site and format are basically the same as last year, with all camps in the same locations. Re-enactor passenger car parking will once again be located behind the Confederate camp. Horse trailer, large vehicle and RV (non hook up) parking will be available in the rodeo grounds at the corner of River & Moscow Rds. Traffic control directors and a shuttle will be available. If you require an RV hook-up contact the Casini Campground directly at (707) 865-2255 or e-mail info@casiniranch.com, or any of the nearby camping resorts on the Russian River.

The interconnecting meadows are spacious and provide shade along the perimeters. Both Confederate and Union camp sites also have available wooded "campaign style" camping areas. Be aware! Poison oak is persistent in all wooded areas, so enter at your own risk! The mid-July weather is typically mild, with temperatures in the mid-seventies during the day. Due to proximity to the ocean, evenings can be relatively cool and foggy. Straw, firewood, water and porta-potties will be provided at all camp sites. Hay and water troughs for mounted units are available. Trash containers will be available, so please leave areas clean when you leave. In ground fire pits are allowed, just back fill all holes. Fire danger is always a concern and must be paramount in everyone's minds. All fires require a bucket of water immediately available - NO EXCEPTIONS. No discharging of weapons of any kind is allowed beyond the battlefield areas.

Reenacting members of recognized reenacting clubs (e.g. PACWR, ACWA, ACWS, CCWR, CWRS, FTHA, NCWA, RACW, WBSHA) are all invited to the event. These members need to show their club's membership card to receive discount entry fees. Any reenactor not having a recognized club membership card will need to pay a fee of \$20.00.

To try and recoup what we now have to pay for land usage, this year we will institute a policy of charging reenactors a fee to attend the event. Reenactors with a current membership card from a recognized club will pay a flat fee at registration of \$10. Families with current cards for all members registering at once will pay \$15. As has always been the case in the past, those without current membership cards at time of registration will





continue to pay \$20 per individual or \$30 for all family members registering at one time. We know that this may be difficult for some, onerous to others, but hopefully understood by all. Unless and until we find sponsor(s) to defray our expenses something like this has to be done to keep the event going.

CHAS supports the West Coast reenacting federation and as such supports the reenacting community. Club membership in a recognized reenacting organization supports this effort. All reenactors will be issued an event ID card upon check in. Retain this card, as command and CHAS event staff will be checking. Concession- style food and beverages will be for sale during public hours in the sutler/ civilian area. CHAS has adopted the West Coast federation's (PACWR's) standard safety rules for the event. These are listed on the web site for review. Any safety issues will be dealt with swiftly using the club Presidents of ACWA, CHAS & NCWA.

Back by popular demand, the Saturday night dance will be held from 8:00 to 11:00 at the Casini Campground recreation hall, next to the General Store near the campground entrance off Moscow Road. Due to an expected large turnout, this will be an outside venue open to reenactors and the public. Period dress is of course preferred, but not required. There will be a shuttle from the event main entry bridge area to the dance location from 7:30 to 11:30 pm. There will also be parking available at the dance site if you wish to drive. Or you can walk the one mile to the dance if you prefer. There is no charge for the dance, but since last year's dance lost money we will be placing a donation box at the hall. Beverages and snacks can be purchased at the General Store adjacent to the dance area.

REENACTOR ARRIVAL TIME:

Begins Friday at 12:00 noon. Unit set-up locations will be staked out. Sutlers may begin arriving Thursday and need to check in with Sutler coordinator Lewis Williams for set up locations.

PUBLIC HOURS:

Saturday, July 19th - 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. NOTE: All re-enactor cars must be out of camps at 9:00 am. No vehicles will be allowed back until after public hours end on Sunday, so plan accordingly. Sunday, July 20th - 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. Cars will be allowed to reenter camp areas as soon as we can get the public out of the areas and it becomes safe to enter with vehicles. Every effort will be made to get this done quickly.

THE THIRD REGIMENT OF ARTILLERY

Part XIV

At Gettysburg, July 1-3, 1863, (F-K) again acted a distinguished part, losing Lt. Manning Livingston and 8 enlisted men killed, 14 wounded, 1 missing and 45 horses killed. It was on the Emmitsburg road supporting Humphreys' division when Sickles' corps was attacked at Peach Orchard. This was about 3.30 P. M. July 2d. Here Capt. D.R. Ransom while placing (F-K) in position was wounded. When Sickles' corps fell back, (F-K) was rescued with only the greatest difficulty. It was in the thickest of the fight when A. P. Hill took Birney's division in flank. Humphreys speaks in highest terms of the performance of the battery that day.

When Lee moved from in front of Hooker on the offensive campaign which terminated at Gettysburg, C was with Gregg's cavalry guarding the Union right flank. It was in the engagements at Brandy Station June 8, Aldie June 17, Middleburg June 18-19, Upperville June 21st. Detached with General Huey's brigade it marched for York, Penn., in which general direction the rebel army seemed bent. It was upon this service when the battle of Gettysburg was fought. Being recalled, it arrived just in time to harass the retreating enemy. In doing this it was engaged at Smithburg, Maryland, July 5; Williamsport, Md., July 6; Boonsborough, Md., July 8; Antietam and Funkstown, Md., July 10 and 11; near Port Royal, Va., September 1st; at Brandy Station, Culpepper and Rapidan River, September 12-14, at Madison Court-house and Robertson's ford September 22-23, 1863.

C was early in the field in 1864. It accompanied Kilpatrick in his raid to Richmond, being engaged at Mechanicsville, Va., March 1st, and stopped long enough in passing to throw 150 shells into the works guarding the enemy's capital. Soon after this (C-F-K), consolidated, became one battery, serving with the cavalry. Under Sheridan it was actively

employed. It accompanied him in his raid on Richmond, May 9-24, 1864, passing the right of the enemy's army, defeating his cavalry, rejoining General Grant June 24, near Chesterfield, Va. During the flank march to the James River, the battery was engaged at Hanover Court House, May 31; Ashland, June 1, Bethesda Church, June 3, and at the White House, June 20, 1864.

The next service of (C-F-K) was with Sheridan in the Shenandoah Valley. It was attached to the horse artillery brigade, commanded by Captain L. L. Livingston. Engaged near Winchester, August 11, on road to Front Royal, August 16, at Woolperth's cross-road and Sheperdstown, August 25, and Smithfield, August 29, 1864. The character of these affairs presaged the nature of the fighting that was to follow. Each commander, but particularly Early, seemed anxious to test the capacity and mettle of his opponent.

In the battle of Cedar Creek, October 19, 1864, (C-K-F) was present. After this it was engaged with others of Sheridan's troops in sweeping the Shenandoah Valley of the enemy, the engagement at Mount Jackson, Va., being the severest in which the battery took part. This practically closed the fighting of the battery during the war. That winter it went into quarters at Pleasant Valley, Maryland, and the next spring moved to the vicinity of Washington City.

When the 9th Army Corps came east in March, 1864, it was increased, before joining the Army of the Potomac, by several regiments and batteries, and among the others, G, equipped as field artillery. This battery accompanied the corps to the Wilderness where it partook in all the fighting of the latter until May 14. As is well known the country was not favorable for the maneuver of light artillery, and consequently General Grant sent a large part back to the defenses of Washington and among others G. (L-M) arrived at the same time. Later they were joined by Battery I. They remained in a condition of preparedness for active service; but, from this time on, except when Early made his attempt on Washington in July, 1864, nothing seriously demanding their attention occurred.

Thus it will be seen that B and D alone were not at some time equipped as light artillery with the armies in the field. They remained at San Francisco harbor, where their services were deemed to be of

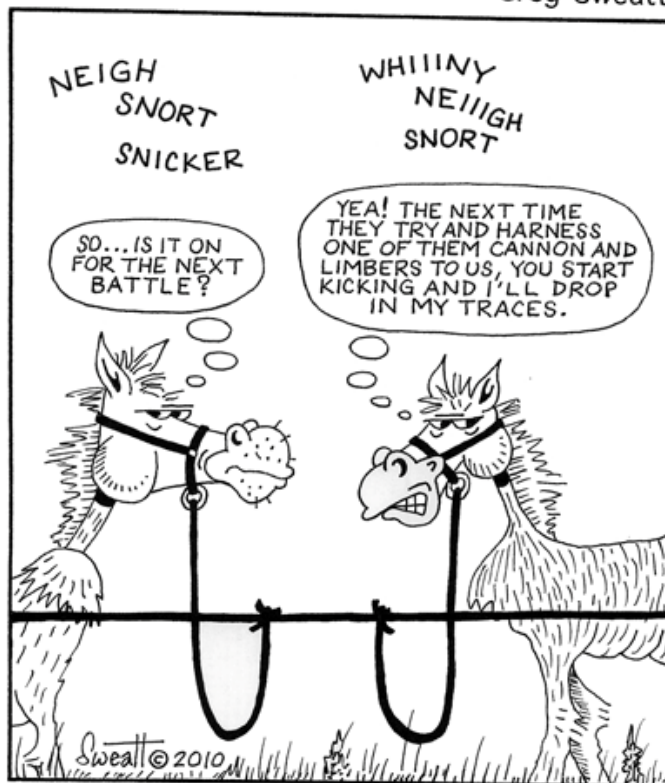
more importance than they could be elsewhere. And when we reflect upon the absolute necessity that existed for preventing that city from falling into the enemy's possession, through their cruisers, it must be conceded that these companies best served their country as garrison artillery in the city's defenses. C, as has been seen, was equipped as horse artillery during the Mexican War, so that B remains the only organization in the Third which at some time has not been equipped as light artillery.

Here terminates the "historical sketch" of the Third, for the pages of the JOURNAL OF THE MILITARY SERVICE INSTITUTION. It would be interesting to pursue the subject to later periods; yet subsequent events can scarcely be spoken of as "historical." but what is of determinative importance in the matter, we have already occupied to the full the limits permitted us in the JOURNAL'S pages. The Third Artillery stands on its record. It has ever done its whole duty. Neither the regiment nor any of its officers has ever intrigued to impose that duty on another.



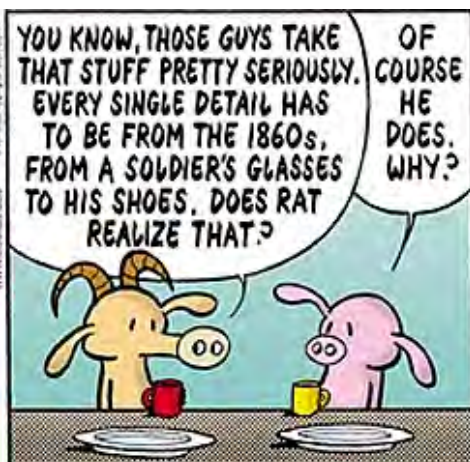

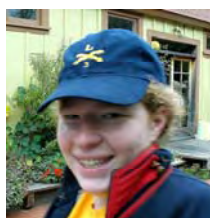
